The Roof Story

The roofers came Thursday...The ominus black trailer rumbled into the driveway, the metal screech of ladders being pushed up to the top. Soon the scraping and clawing began on the roof, shoveling the old weather-beaten shingles off. The driveway and sidewalk strewn with falling old roofing and age blackened cedar shingles.



The young men's tough boots traversing the 25-foot ladders to the top. A conveyor truck loaded the roof with plywood to sheath the rafters. Then the bundles of shingles to load onto the peak. Compressors hummed away accompanied by the rhythmic sound of bullet nails affixing the roll of 30 pound tar paper. Then came the four shots for each strip of shingles laid across the roof....edging ever higher towards the peak.

The little old lady inside the house pours herself a second cup

of coffee....gazes out the living room window at the raining debris...goes back to reading her mail and takes her nap. Her dreams of years gone by...42 to be exact...when she was up on that same roof nailing down the shingles over the old cedar ones. It took her and Paris, her young helper, two weeks to finish the job.

She had done her homework, figuring out the procedure and then went down to the roofing supply depot and bought the supplies...at least the amount she could afford and haul at a time.

Roger, the carpenter, had framed in the entrance to the attic...built a sturdy 2x4 ladder to climb up....then boxed in the skylight to the roof. Through the attic they trudged the supplies and stacked them near the open skylight.

Row by row they had pulled the weather beaten tarred shingles off. Working four feet wide sections across the roof and tossed the worn out shingles to the driveway below. Every couple hours they took a break, sat back and quietly enjoyed the view... the shimmering sun, hazy blue of the bay and the golden gate bridge beyond.... sipped their cool drink...and got back to work.

Once the original cedar shingles were revealed and cleared of nails the covering of tar paper was rolled out and nailed in place. Paris handed up the four pieces of heavy shingles at a time and Carole stacked them across the peak. Then they got to work. One row of shingles across... covering the new tar paper. Three hits per nair, four nails per shingle, ten shingles per row ...one

day at a time...for two weeks...until the roof was covered and secure.

Waking, she picked up her mail again, perused the utility bill, the property tax assessment, and her telephone stock summary. Satisfied, she laid them on the table next to her coffee. With a wrinkled hand, she smoothed out the folded roofing contract, put on her reading glasses, and began writing the checks... and smiled.


the nexting beaut

End Slavery in California: ACA-3

Wisely and with justice the BFUU congregation quickly endorsed the **End Slavery in California Act-ACA-3** at October 9th's Bi-Annual Congregational Meeting. We determined by the BFUU Bylaws that I could make the motion without prior approval. All of us in BFUU have just become aware of the fact that our constitution allows for slavery. **ACA-3** actually started in 2020 with our own Senator Skinner and Representative Wicks being co-sponsors. **ACA-3** was intended to eliminate the "exception" clause allowing involuntary servitude/slavery to be ordered on California prisoners.

•Article 1 section 6 states that slavery or involuntary servitude are abolished **"except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted."**

•ACA-3 was expected to pass easily and be put on the November ballot for Californians to pass it. NOT! It failed this past June due to a time limit abused by opponents in the Senate. YES! Just as in the US Constitution Amendment 13, slavery/involuntary servitude is still allowed for those convicted of a crime. This is how mass incarceration has been able to fill our prisons with a majority of Black people. We have to take up the campaign once again!

BFUU learned in the 2015 sermon by John J. Jones, III that the US Constitution's Amendment 13 allowed for the "exception" for slavery. However, we weren't made aware that our own constitution also had the "exception". **BFUU** has participated in fighting mass incarceration here in Alameda County within the Justice Reinvestment Coalition of Alameda County – **JRC/AC**, and lately with the Interfaith Coalition For Justice In Our Jails- **ICJJ**. < https://www.icjjalamedacounty.org/> **BFUU** also is motivated by endorsing our new **Principle 8** that commits us to doing everything possible to eliminate systemic racism.

The UUA dealt with modern slavery in its General Assembly of 2003, "Abolition Today:Ending Modern Slavery < https://www.uua.org/ga/past/2003/57587.shtml> UUA President Rev. William Sinkford said, "the continued existence of slavery around the world in the 21st century poses a challenge that most of us have thus far not addressed."

"The lowest I got paid was nothing. The highest that I got paid was 75 cents an hour. And then they would take 55 percent of that. If I said no, I would be given another 15 years in prison." Samual served 24 years in the California state prison, subject to what he called modern slavery. They tell the public you have a right to say no, but if you do say no, you will receive a discipline report, the "equivalent of the modern day whip." "Torture, sitting in prison for life." There are countless reports of Correctional Officers beating and killing prisoners." "They took slavery off the main street and put it behind prison gates."

With his wife's encouragement Samual wrote the ACA-3 amendment and brought it to Rep. Kalager of LA. It passed unanimously through all the California assembly committees. Then the opponents began false storytelling. "The bill was to make life easy on imprisoned people, disregarding the rights of victims." In the end the ACA-3 never got voted on due to delaying time in June 2022. The ACLU reported in June 2022 that prisoners generate \$2 billion a year, and \$9 billion from services are provided by prisoners. "They get paid almost nothing." So, prisoners make \$11billion annually. The critics said paying prisoners minimum wage would cost \$1.5 billion. If so, there would still be \$9.5 billion from prisoners. 
